


3 major iterations of the program to date:

Until 2022

Kalwun Children
in OOHC Pathway
Jan 2020- June 2022

OOHC Pathway and Supporting Minds

March 2023 – present







Supporting Minds OOH - Service Overview

Started: April 2023

Services:

- Clinical care coordination to First Nations children in OOHC within Kalwun Health Services
- 6-sessions of psychological therapy to kids aged 6-19 with mild to moderate mental health issues

Eligibility

- Kids who reside on Gold Coast
- Or case managed by Gold Coast Child Safety Centre for therapy







Tier 1

Children New to Care

Children new to care on short-term and long-term orders.

Children not in permanent foster care arrangements

Children at risk of losing their family base placement

Children engaged in active reunification efforts with parent

Tier 2

Situational Crisis Support

New behaviours coincide with significant changes to the child's circumstances such as:

New contact changes

Health concerns

Education changes - challenges or disengagement

Struggling behaviours within the placement

Tier 3

Long-term Support

Children on Long-Term orders including orders to Long-term to other (LTG-O) and permanency order (PCO)

Children have accessed the program 12 months prior when not in situational crisis

Already engaged with another therapeutic provider

Clinical Care Coordination

Improve young people's psychological, social and behavioral factors within chronic illnesses and promote health self-management

- **Early intervention** for 0-7 years
- Psychological intervention for older children
- Central wrap-around support for child safety, carers, parents and children
- Co-ordination across all providers to improve health outcomes
- Establishment of an urgent health assessment pathway for high-risk removals (used twice since 2021)
- No exclusion criteria but works within a tiered system







Therapeutic Support

Discussion and play in one-on-one environment

- Young person facilitated with goals and discussion
- Giving them a space to feel heard and discuss their big feeling.
- Big feels often changes in placement, contact or daily struggles of being a kid in care

Group session/work in collaboration with Evolve Threptic Services

- More of a drop-in service
- Don't need to be a patient of ETS.
- Allowing First Nations OOHC safe space for exploring engagement and service provision.
- Focus on culture art, play, discussion and learning









Outcomes to Date



130+ Kids in OOHC had or booked health assessments



36% new
Kalwun patients
with one or no
health
assessment
completed



53% had positive health outcomes: no concern or linked with working supports.




10% of new patients were already patients of Kalwun health services.



11% had decline in health outcomes: no support or increased behavioral concerns.



Coomera: busiest clinic for out-of-home care children

Partnership Case Study - Background

- Mother identify to be aboriginal engaged with Child Safety under an investigation.
- Child safety officer (CSO) wanted to explore service support and engagement for the kids coming into care.
- Children had significant behavioural and health needs
- Had recently engaged with a health provider but with limited support outside of health reviews and referral to child development unit.
- Child Safety Officer consulted:
 - Health Liaison
 - Child Protection Unit Nurse Consultant
 - Supporting Minds OOH







Partnership Case Study - Outcomes

- Nurse found that the children were not identified on QHealth system.
- Their referral was upgraded from Cata 3 to Cata 2.
- Appropriate Kalwun GP Identified by SM and CSO.
- On the spot appointment made during consult with CSO and paperwork provided.
- CSO worked with family to attend appointment and assisted in linking family to:
 - o CDS
 - o Kalwun Health Services Paediatrician team
 - Kalwun Family Support.
- Referral process aided in reducing Child Safety concerns
- Children not coming into care.
