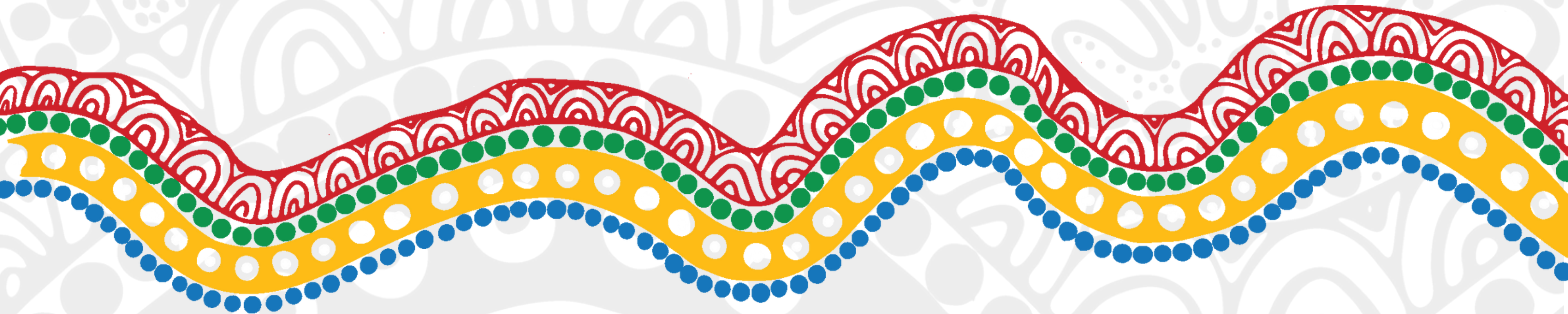

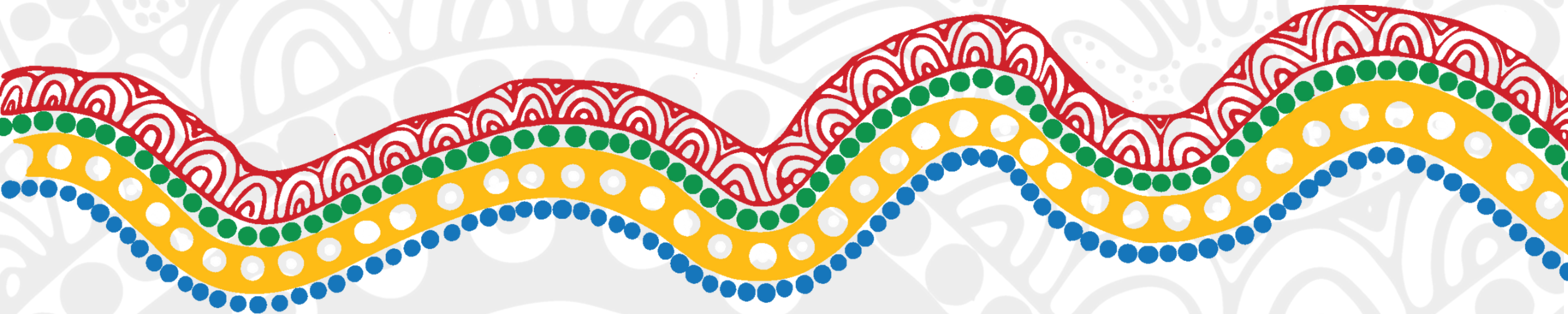


Acknowledgement and Introduction

May we walk together in the spirit of respect, learning, and reconciliation .

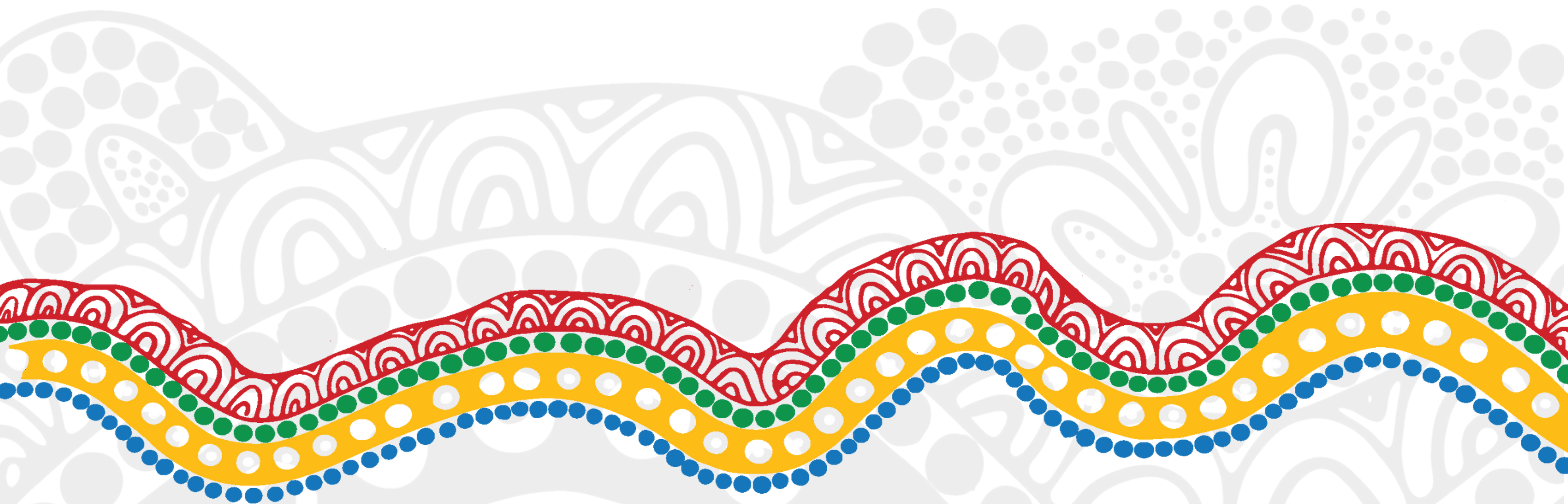

Cultural Safety in Practice

- Respectful communication
- Recognition of power imbalances
- Patient empowerment
- Commitment to self-reflection and continuous improvement



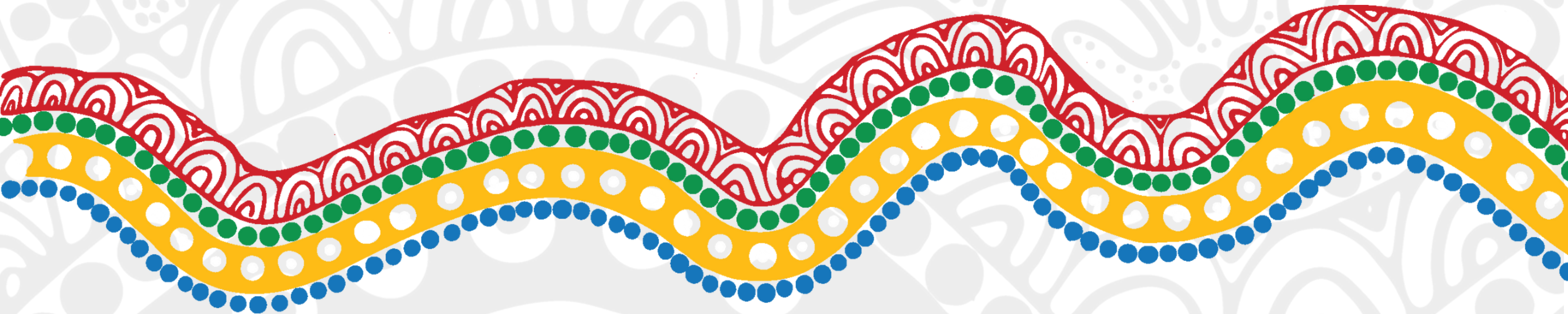
Immediate (Short-Term) Actions

- Inclusive signage and environment
- Acknowledgement of Country
- Pronouncing names correctly
- Asking about cultural identity in a respectful way



Longer-Term Commitments

- Participating in cultural safety training
- Building relationships with local communities and Elders
- Embedding cultural protocols into clinic procedures
- Creating space for cultural supervision



Practice-Wide Cultural Safety

- Audit practice environment and policies
- Engage staff in cultural learning
- Partner with local ACCHOs
- Reflect cultural safety in recruitment and onboarding

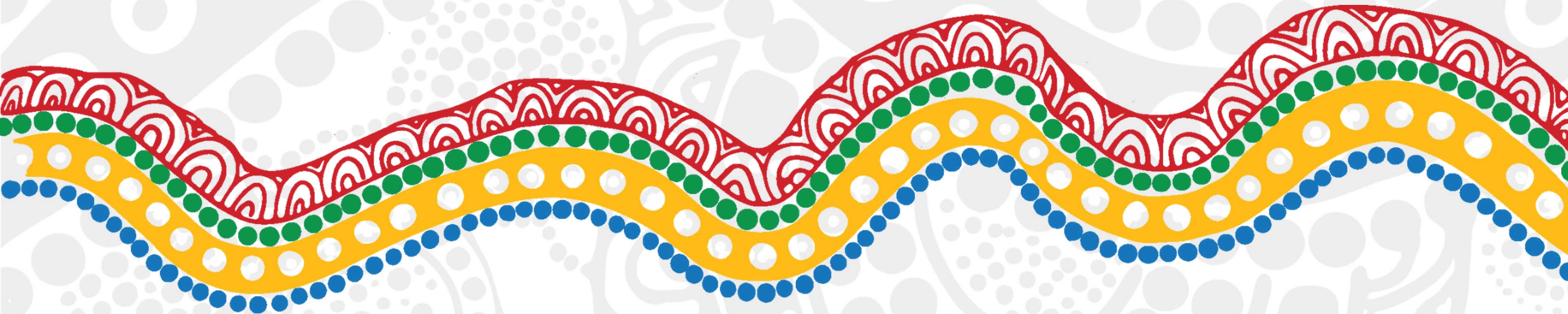

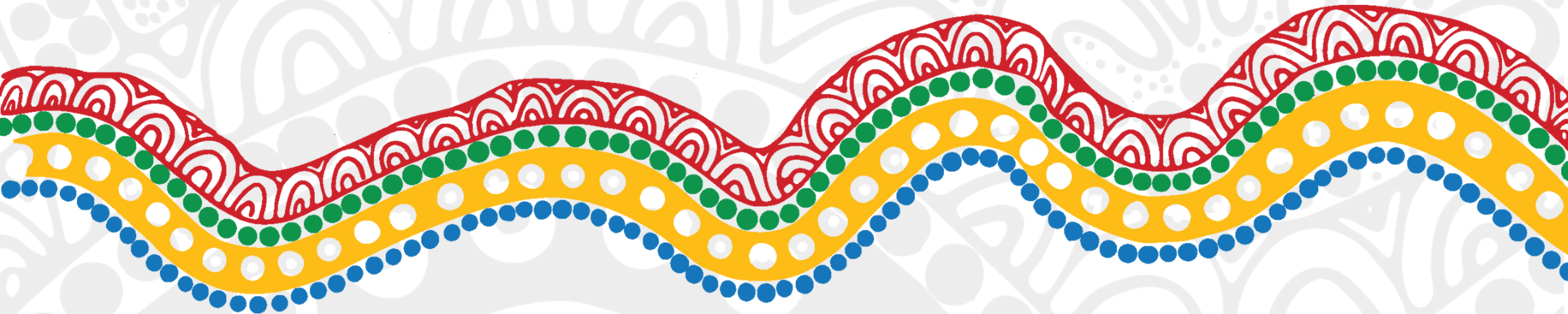

‘Spotlight on the Integrated Team Care (ITC) Program’



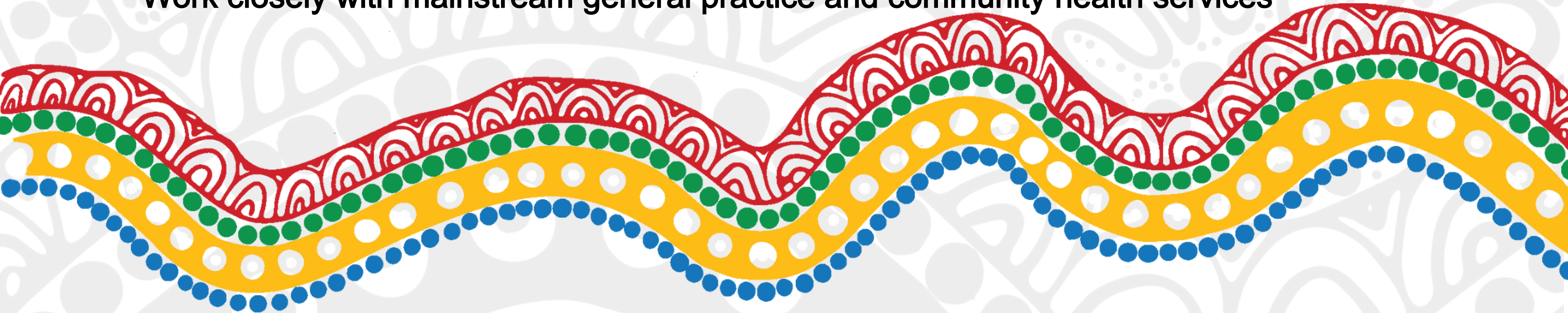
What Is the ITC Program?

- Funded by Department of Health and Aged Care
- Delivered through Primary Health Networks
- Supports Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people with chronic disease
- Coordinates culturally safe, team-based care



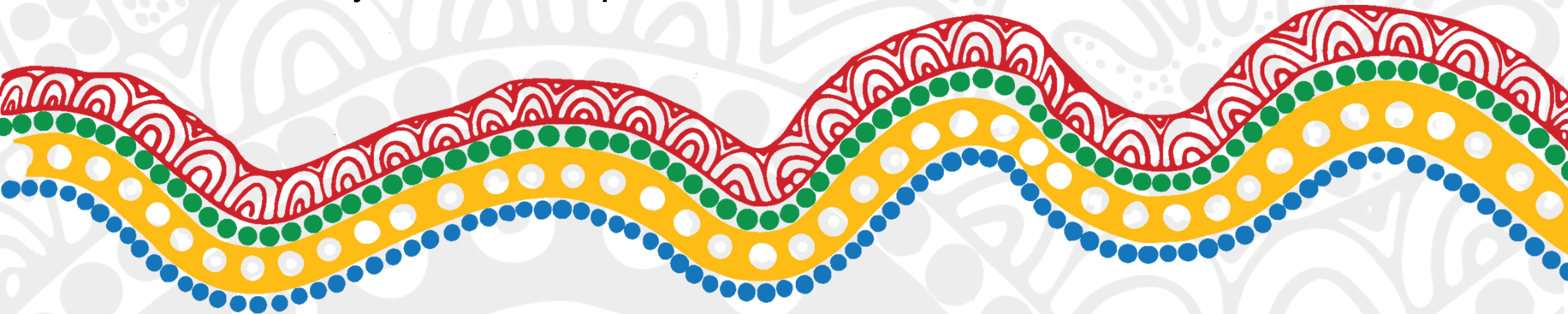
Role of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health Project Officers

- Provides leadership in Integrated Team Care in each region
- Works alongside outreach workers and care coordinators
- Drive culturally safe models of care
- Work closely with mainstream general practice and community health services



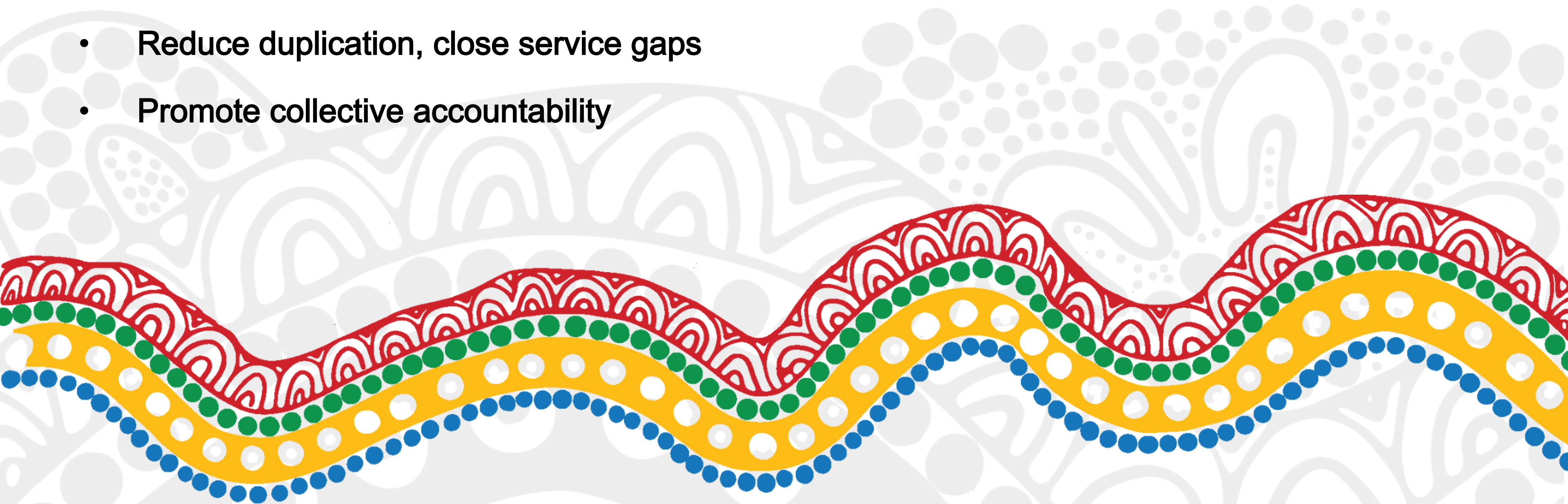
Building Capacity in Mainstream Practices

- Support GPs and staff to understand cultural context
- Provide advice and training
- Help practices audit and improve service delivery
- Share culturally relevant health promotion materials



Facilitating System-Wide Collaboration

- Project officers connect GPs, hospitals, ACCHOs, specialists
- Encourage shared care planning
- Reduce duplication, close service gaps
- Promote collective accountability



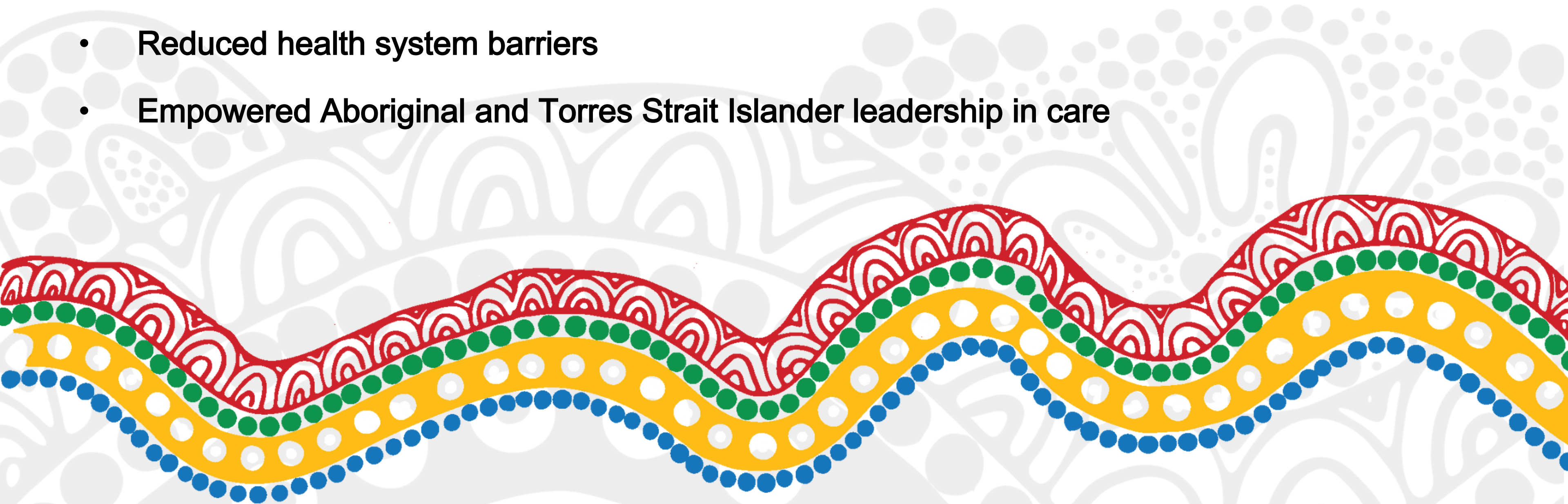
Engagement with ITC

- Invite project officers to team meetings
- Refer eligible patients to ITC
- Engage in joint care coordination
- Seek advice when unsure about cultural matters



Impact of Culturally Safe Partnerships

- Increased patient trust and attendance
- Better chronic disease outcomes
- Reduced health system barriers
- Empowered Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander leadership in care

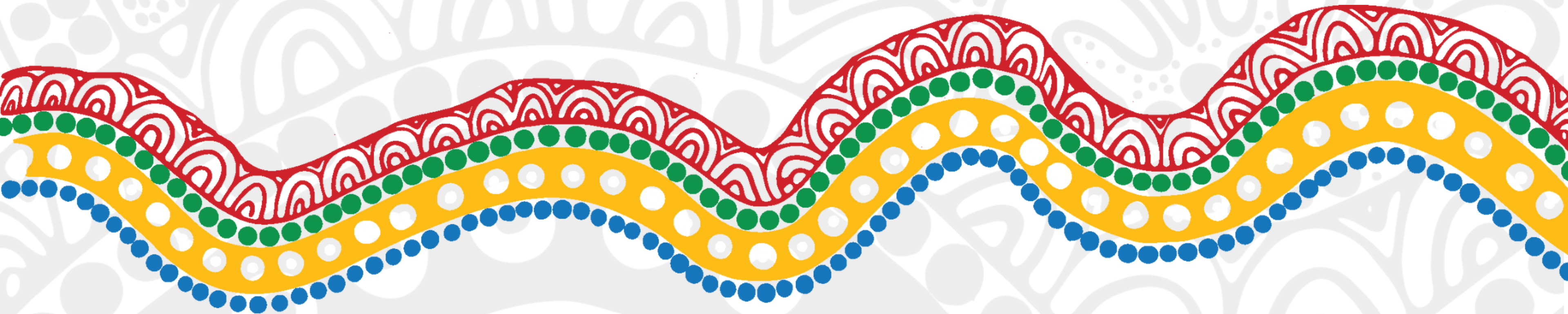

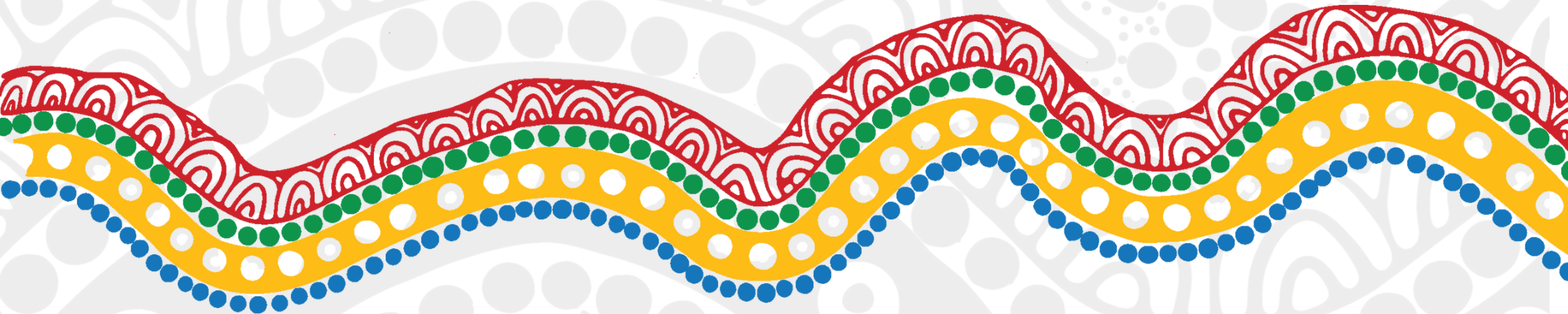
Cultural safety is an ongoing journey.
